# Take Six at Tribeca

BLOCKBUSTERS AND INDIES MINGLE AT DE NIRO'S ANNUAL FILM FESTIVAL

By David Freedlander Special to amNewYork The Tribeca Film Festival returns to the cobbled streets of Lower Manhattan next week with its usual assortment of flashy movies and smaller gems. Pay heed, though: Tickets cost more this year.

more this year.

On the glitzy end, a few major studio films will be premiering at the festival: "Spider-Man 3," "The Gates," a film about Jean-Claude and Christo's saffron installation in Central Park, and "Lucky You," starring Drew Barrymore and Robert Duvall.

But Tribeca has always been as much about small, politically oriented films as it has been about the big tickets, and this year brings a raft of films about Afghanistan and several

others about the Latino experience in the U.S. Also, Al Gore will host the opening night gala, which will feature a series of short films about global warming.

"The artist as activist is really the heart of what this festival has been," said Jane Rosenthal, who co-founded the event with Robert De Niro after the 9/11 attacks. "We started this because of an act of war. As filmmakers we were sitting here wondering what we could do for our community."

With 160 films showing in 17 theaters throughout Manhattan, Tribeca has gained a reputation for programming shoot 'em up action films alongside highbrow art flicks.

"Movies are our last

hope to bring people together who don't understand each other," said Peter Scarlet, executive director of the festival. "There is a collision here between art house films and general interest films, but it's the kind of collision where sparks really fly."

Tribeca has had a meteoric rise into the upper echelon of film festivals around the world, but still lacks some of the prestige of Cannes, Sundance and Toronto.

"There are probably five times as many film festivals as there were 10 years ago," said Christian Gaines, director of festivals at the American Film Institute. "Tribeca is an extremely well-resourced player, It really sprinted out of the gate with a lot of energy and

marketing reach." Some film industry insiders have wondered why such a well-financed festival — besides De Niro, it's backed by corporate support from American Express — needs to charge so much for tickets. Prices went up by 50 percent this year, to \$18, more than any other film festival and more than it costs to see a first-run movie in any local theater. Organizers say the festival has been running at a million-dollar deficit, and a price increase couldn't be avoided.

"We've raised our prices, yeah," said Scarlet. "But it costs a lot of money to put on a film festival."
